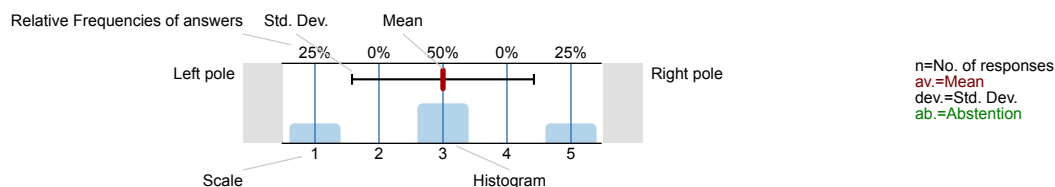

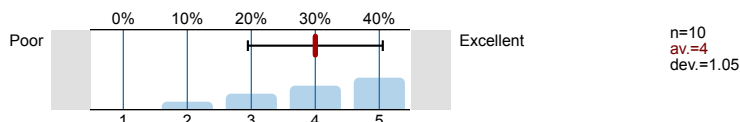

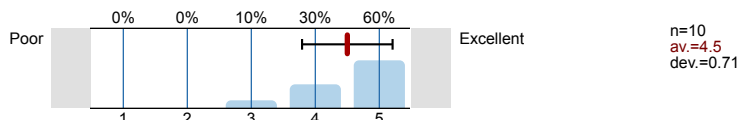


1. TA EVALUATION

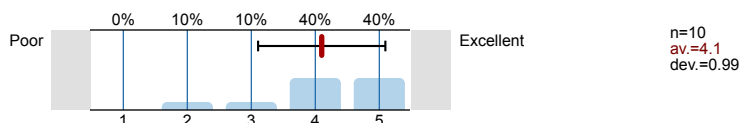
1.1) What is the overall ranking of the teaching assistant?



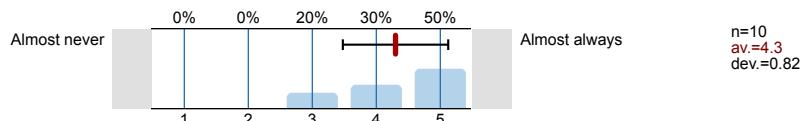
1.2) The teaching assistant was able to answer student's questions.
