## Sample Questions

These questions concentrate on Chapters 14–18. Look at the earlier sample exams and midterms to review the earlier chapters. 1) Sketch the proof that there are infinitely many prime numbers.

2) State the Pigeonhole Principle.

3) Find gcd(273,221). Find  $x, y \in \mathbb{Z}$  such that gcd(273,221) = 273x + 221y.

4) Sketch the proof that  $\mathbb{R}$ , the set of real numbers, is uncountable.

5) Decide if each of the following statement is TRUE or FALSE. If FALSE, give an example showing it is FALSE.

a) If A is countable, then A is infinite.

b) If |X| = |Y| and  $f: X \to Y$  is injective, then f is a bijection.

b) The relation  $x \sim y$  if and only if x + y is odd for  $x, y \in \mathbb{Z}$  is an equivalence relation.

- d) If  $f: X \to Y$ , then  $\{\overleftarrow{f}(y) : y \in Y\}$  is a partition of X. e) There are  $x, y \in \mathbb{Z}$  such that 35x + 28y = 15

6) The dyadic rationals is the set  $D = \{\frac{a}{2^n} : a \in \mathbb{Z}, n \in \mathbb{N}\}$ . Prove that D is countable.
