Course objectives

This course is intended to help prepare students for high level mathematical reasoning and more generally, to help students transition from regular math courses, such as Calculus, to more abstract courses based on reading and writing mathematical proofs.

Our objective is to learn the language of mathematics, to learn to read and write structured mathematical proofs, to be able to judge if a proof is correct or incorrect and to defend a correct mathematical argument.

The subject matter chosen for this task is basic number theory, set theory and some combinatorics. However, the subject matter is not the emphasis, it is more a vehicle to learning and practicing the techniques.
